The Art Board, 1170 Nuuanu Ave. #104, 536-0121; Introduction of the *Father and Son Series* by **Jintaro Nishimura** and **Keiichi Nishimura**; a combination painting by a Japanese master artist (father) and his internationally recognized artist son. And *PO'OLEI 'UPENA* traditional Hawaiian industries and fine art exhibition featuring: **Solomon Enos, Meala Aloha, Puni Kukahiko, Kupihea Romero** and **Dalani Tanaye**.

The ARTS at Marks Garage, 1159 Nuuanu Ave., 521-2903; Paintings created on-site live! Hawaii Watercolor Society presents: *Small Kine Show*, small paintings at small prices. Small watercolor paintings or prints are 8"x10" or smaller with prices ranging from \$30 to \$100 all done by members of the Hawaii Watercolor Society. An excellent opportunity to acquire Island art at reasonable prices.

The Exhibit Space at 1132 Bishop Street, 1132 Bishop St., 599-5009; *Great Impressions, Contemporary Prints of Hawai'i*. An artist reception from 4:00 – 5:30 PM. Works by thirty prominent printmakers including mezzotint artists **Dodie Warren** and **Christine Harris-Amos**. Large-scale silkscreen prints by **Allyn Bromley**, lithographs by **David Smith**, large-scale drypoints by **Charles Cohan**, and silkscreen transfer decals by **Suzanne Wolfe**, dominate the front of the lobby. The heart of the exhibit is located just in front of the up escalator and includes work by **George Woollard, Hanae Mills, Ken Bushnell, Kloe Kang, Duncan Dempster, Jodi Endicott, Carl Jennings, Hwa-Ja Park, Shirley Hasenyager, Alan Leitner, Liz Nakoa, and Helen Wilder**. Rounding out the exhibit are works by **Donna Broder, Adella Buss, Debby Young, Diane Ko, Gina Kerr, Lynn Cook, Elizabeth Urayase, and Joe Singer**.

Hawai'i State Art Museum (HiSAM), 250 S. Hotel St., 586-0900; *Art in Public Places*, explores Hawai'i's Art in Public Places Program from 1967 to the present. As the first state in the

nation to adopt a percent-for-art law, Hawai'i became a leader in commissioning and displaying art in public places to beautify its state buildings and increase access to the arts. The purpose of this exhibition is to introduce audiences to the concept of public art. A series of galleries will describe the commissioning process, highlight public art projects, and provide a history of public art in the United States. Exhibition runs through September 3, 2006. HiSAM will have Jeff Gere conduct 12 PM and 1:30 PM Art Off The Wall tours.
